From the Pastor

This will be the last time I write this column. Much has happened to both you and to me since we first met. As many of you know I am no longer the three quarter time pastor of Grace Lutheran Church in Canastota and I am soon no longer to be even the part time Pastor. In the words of a fellow Child of God, "For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven."

In God's grand scheme there was a time for His Only Begotten Son to be born of a virgin in a lowly stable in Bethlehem. There was a time for Jesus to begin His ministry among the people He had come to redeem. And in the "Fullness of God's time" Jesus suffered and died for the sins of the whole of humanity, including your sins and my sins. But again, in His time, three days later, Jesus conquered death and the grave and rose victorious over sin, death, the grave and Satan; obtaining for us the full and total forgiveness of our sins and assuring us of life eternal in the glories of a Christ-prepared mansion in heaven.

We are presently in the season of Lent during which we are called to remember our sinfulness which caused Jesus' Incarnation and subsequent suffering and death. But soon, it will be the season to rejoice and again sing "Alleluia," Christ is Risen, He is Risen indeed. To God alone be the Glory, forever. May this ever be our greatest joy.

As I prepare for this new chapter in my life, I am humbled to note who I am, what, by the Grace of God, I have been privileged to do and where I have been called to do it. When I began this journey in ministry some thirty years ago I could never have predicted the path I would walk and the place and circumstance under which it would end.

God has richly blessed me and my family throughout our mutual journey through times of great joy and sorrow. Through it all we have never lost sight of His guiding hand and His omnipresence. According to my plan, my retirement would come some few more years down the road; according to God's plan it is to come here, on 31 March.

This year, 2013, 31 March is the Feast of the Resurrection, perhaps more commonly known as Easter Sunday. It is, for me, a time of sorrow and a time of great joy. The sorrow is, I believe, obvious; the joy is being able to "go out" proclaiming the Joyous News of the Resurrection.

As I leave, there are a couple of things I want to leave with you:

Let me tell you a little bit about what we know concerning our Lutheran Church in this twenty-first century.

- The church we attend is NOT our Grandfather's (or Father's) Lutheran Church
- At least 80% of our congregations are either plateaued or in decline
- Many of these congregations have significant endowments which could enable vital and viable ministry but the congregations choose to use their resources to simply maintain
- Without intervention many of the 80% above will not exist in ten years
- If we keep doing ministry the same way we have been doing it for the past thirty to fifty years, we will continue to get the same results we have been getting: Decline, and eventual demise.
- The majority of our congregations are in a maintenance mode: they have not and are not fulfilling our Lord's Great Commission to "Go and Make Disciples," but are simply trying to stay in existence for some purely selfish reason.
- Congregations who have an outreach focus are blessed by God. They have more than enough resources in terms of time, talent and treasures to do the ministry that needs to be done. (Translated that means they have the bodies and bucks they need to do ministry.)

Our Lord, before He ascended into heaven left His Church (that’s you and me) with specific instructions concerning what we are to be about and how we are to go about it. In the twenty-eighth chapter of St. Matthew’s Gospel, verses nineteen and twenty Jesus Said, “Go, make Disciples of all nations, baptize them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teach them to obey all that I have commanded you.”

Pretty specific marching orders, do you not agree? Jesus commanded His Disciples of the first century and the twenty-first century to: “**GO!**” He did not say “hang around the temple or synagogue or church and make it look pretty so people will be impressed and want to come in and join up.” He did not say, “Make your worship appealing and enticing to you and to those around so that you will stay and they will come on down and put their bodies in your pews and their bucks in your offering plates.” He said, “**GO, MAKE DISCIPLES!**”

He said, “**BAPTIZE THEM!**” He did not say “run enough fund raisers and programs to make sure you have enough money to keep things going as you think they should go.” He said, “**TEACH THEM!**” He did not say, “Entertain them with good music and good liturgy and drama in order that they will join up and bring their friends.”

And then there is that wonderful, glorious and Grace-filled promise, “**REMEMBER I AM WITH YOU ALWAYS, TO THE END OF THE AGE.**” “I am with you always.” This promise of Jesus grants us the strength and the grace to move forward and do what He has commanded no matter how adverse or difficult the circumstances surrounding our ministry. In other words, as we do the will of the Lord, He will be with us, strengthen and enable us to fulfill His Command.

But here is where we fall down. Like Peter walking on the water, we see the waves of fewer bodies in the pews and bucks in the collection plate and we panic and begin to flail our arms in the water as it swirls around our head. “What should we do? We need more bodies and more bucks, what shall we do?”

Suddenly it is all about us again and we forget our Lord’s words and promises. We panic and enter our survival mode. But that mode is utterly devoid of God; it is all about us and what we can and must do to survive. It is not about ministry and saving dying and perishing souls.

The early Church of the first century had a different perspective. Read the Book of Acts – it is pretty clear how the Church our Lord left not only survived but thrived and grew. “And they devoted themselves to the Apostle’s teaching and Fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers...and day by day The Lord added to their number those who were being saved.” Acts 2:42, 47

If we are to survive and flourish as the Church of our Lord in the twenty-first century we **MUST** get back to the basics of ministry. We **MUST** “Become lights on a hill, Apostolic Mission Outposts in the world,” in the words of a dear friend and former “Bishop” in our district.

People are dying every day, all around us; they do not know Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior and they are going straight to hell. They think Easter is about bunnies, flowers, candy and, yes, dare I say – gathering at the lake in the early morning hours because it’s a tradition. And that is not their fault, it is our fault. We have the Good News of the Gospel and we **MUST** be all and alone about sharing it with those who not only do not have it, but do not even know they need it.

Jesus told us to **GO, MAKE DISCIPLES, BAPTIZE,** and **TEACH.** Those are His words; that is His command. We have **NO** alternative. **NOTHING** is more important – not our buildings, not our music, not our liturgy and certainly not the amount of money we have in the bank. What part of if you do this “I will be with you always” do we not understand?


A fellow Pastor used to close all of his correspondence and conversations with the words, “I’ll see you on the battlefield.” It is a battlefield out there. People are dying and we have the “Words of Eternal Life” to share with them. Let us not get caught up in the mundane; let us, instead, get down in the trenches and “Tell The Good

News About Jesus” to all we meet and interact with daily. Let us get away from the “good old days.” They are gone and they will not be coming back. Let us get back to the basics of ministry: **MAKING DISCIPLES, BAPTIZING, TEACHING.** If we do this, God will be with us and bless our ministry – not for our glory but for His.

Thank you so very much for the privilege of being your Pastor and for the opportunity of sharing God’s Great Good News with you. As he retired on 28 February, Pope Benedict XVI promised the faithful in the church that he would continue to pray for them. I too, promise that I will remember you in my prayers. And I pray that God will bless you and keep you; that He will make His face to shine upon you and be Gracious to you; that He will look upon you with His favor and grant you His Peace. In the name of the Father, ✠ and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

A Great Lesson On Stress


We are now in the Lenten season. Purple banners grace our sanctuary, and we come together for worship twice a week. We have soup suppers


