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From the Deacon

When the LCMS began, C.F.W. Walther (the first President of the LCMS) wrote this Statement:

While all religions, except the Christian, teach that man himself must do that by which he is delivered and saved, the Christian religion teaches not merely that all men should be eternally saved but also that they already have been saved. According to the Christian faith, man is already redeemed. He is already delivered and freed from his sin and all its evil consequences. He is already reconciled unto God. The Christian religion proclaims: "You need not redeem yourself nor secure reconciliation between God and yourself, for all this Christ has already accomplished for you. Nor has He left anything for you to do but to believe this, i.e., to accept it!" Here indeed is the point of distinction between Christianity and all other religions. The Jews say: "If you want to be saved, you must keep the Law of Moses." The Turks say: "If you want to be saved, you must follow the Koran." The Papists say: "If you want to be saved, you must do good works, repent of your sins, and make satisfaction for them; and if you want to climb especially high, you must enter a monastery." Similarly, all sects that pervert the Christian religion

impose something on man which he must do to make himself righteous and thus save himself. The Lutheran Church, on the other hand, tells man: "Everything is already accomplished. You have been redeemed. You have been justified before God. You are already saved. You need not do a thing to redeem yourself, to reconcile God, and to earn salvation. All you are asked to do is to believe that Christ, the Son of God, has already done all this for you. Believe this, and you actually are in possession of salvation. You will surely be saved."

This statement was true in 1874 and still holds true today. We are saved by the Grace of God.

Preparing for Advent

For many of us, we are finishing with the harvest (and the Harvest Festival) and all the work that goes into them.

Now we can relax, right? I want to tell you that we must not slow down. We must be ready for the coming of our Savior. You say, "How do we prepare?" We must be in God's Word DAILY! The month of September, my sermons were about our Salvation. In October, they were about Love and Forgiveness. All of these are blessings from God that we are not worthy to receive, but he gives them to us gladly.

When I do my Children's Message, I teach the children that:

God Loves Us
Jesus Saved Us
And the Holy Spirit possesses us

This message is not just for the children, it is for everyone. God has truly blessed all of us! Reflect on your lives and you will come to realize just what God has given to you. Remember that God will always give you what you need.

Praise and Glorify God. Amen.

Overcoming Your Zip-Line

When was the last time you said yes? Without hesitation—no “Maybe,” no “I’ll think about it” or “I’ll get back to you,” but just a heartfelt “Absolutely!” If you are anything like me, the answer is most likely a long time ago, or perhaps even never. What is it that drives us to do the things we do? What motivates you? Think about these things as you continue reading.

On our LWML retreat in September, we were given the chance to go zip-lining. Anyone that knows me well knows that I do not have an adventurous bone in my body. To me, taking a risk is going a little bit over the speed limit! But still, there was something about the idea that had me curious. It was one of those things I’d always wanted to try but never had the opportunity to do so. Many of the women encouraged me, saying things like, “Oh, I did it last year — it’s fun!” “You’re going to love it!” (I quickly learned, about halfway up the 60-foot pole, why it was a one-and-done deal for many.) As I climbed, I kept telling myself, if I get up there and decide not to do it, no big deal. I can back out. They can’t make me do this! There was, however, a part of me that was saying, “Whoa! I’m actually doing this!” I heard cheering from above and below me — I was completely out of breath and trembling when I finally reached the top. I fell apart! My stomach was in knots; I was crying hysterically. There was no way this was happening. What was I even afraid of? Was it the height? Was it not feeling safe in my harness? Was it fear of falling off the zip-line and plummeting 60 feet? Or was it just plain fear of the unknown — trying something new? But still, I was also filled with this overwhelming

excitement. I was determined to accomplish this task (after I collected myself from my panic attack, thanks to Karen).

It was surreal. I was standing there, ready to go, standing on a platform not much bigger than the seat of a chair. I was told to take a step forward, then another. Then... whoosh! I let go! I just went for it! By the time I reached halfway across the zip-line, I let go with one hand. I was overcome with emotion at this point and started to cry! At that moment I couldn’t understand why, but later it all clicked.

How many of us are motivated by fear? How many times have we thought, I’ll think about it; I’ll ask so-and-so about it; I’ll do it if no one else steps up? And then, what if I’m not good enough? What if I can’t do it at all, or as well as the last person? I’m not trained, I’m not qualified, I have other commitments. I know we all do it. We are human. What I got out of my experience, though, is that we belong to a church family that will help you through something simple or something scary, and that with that support, God is calling me, calling all of us to just jump off the edge and say YES! This was what happened when the announcement was made for the need for a Sunday school teacher. I instantly felt God call me to this task. No hesitation, I just said yes. I know that God will provide. God will help us and guide us, and even point to our church family for cheering on, or drying tears, or saying “snap out of it!” (Or in the words of Louise Snyder, “Suck it up, cupcake!”) I am urging all of you to just say yes when something piques your interest even a little bit. Try something new, and remember — “God does not call the qualified, he qualifies the called.”

The Art of Being Thankful



- Mites




